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### **PREFACE**

A remote eastern border district of the Union of India, adjacent to Bangladesh, the district of Murshidabad as a whole had lagged behind in learning and having adequate opportunities of higher education even in the post-independence days. These rural regions of the state of West Bengal, with a very small town Beldanga situated at the southern corner of the District of Murshidabad, had an enormous population of economically backward and illiterate peasants and labourers together with few educated middle class people.

It was almost 18 years since the independence of our great nation; there was no institution for higher education in and around the locality of Beldanga, in spite of existence of a number of schools within the jurisdiction of the region. As a consequence of which, the people of Beldanga and adjourning areas, most of them happened to be poor peasantry class, had been deprived to enter into the arena of higher education standing upon the doorstep of struggle against starvation. As a result of such a weaker socio-economic infrastructure of the region, the locality of Beldanga ranked bottom most in the district of Murshidabad in the sphere of education. Feeling from core of heart of the tremendous crisis of the downtrodden and poor peasants people of Beldanga to cope up with rapid upward trend of having higher educational opportunities of the rest of the state of West Bengal and the country as a whole, some noble souls of the region came forward with a vision of establishing a college of undergraduate level within the locality at the beginning of the 60th decade of the last century. In the process, a noble hearted inhabitant of the locality, Late Sri Rameswar Fatepuria, raised his kind-hand first by donating 3.52 acres of land of his own and cash worth Rs. 50,000/= to set up a college in the locality. A local club, Jano Kalyan Samity, collaborated their hands for arranging all resources to set up the college. Later on, another local noble inhabitant, Hazi Mohammad Mohosin Mollah, raised his kind-hand by donating cash worth Rs. 1,20,000/= for construction of college building. Apart from them, many well-wishers raised their noble-hands of cooperation, in cash and in kind, for setting up the college in the locality.

The honest endeavour of the pioneers, with moral and physical support of the common people of the locality, this esteemed institution came into existence in the year 1965 when the Sewnarayan Rameswar Fatepuria College had been established as an undergraduate college with the affiliation under the University of Calcutta. In the year 1999, the affiliation to the college had been shifted, as per decision of the Higher Education Dept., Govt. of West Bengal, under the University of Kalyani, Nadia, West Bengal. Till then, the institution has been running as an affiliated undergraduate degree college under the University of Kalyani. All the three popular streams of subjects, viz. Science, commerce and arts, are presently taught by this esteemed institution with combined total of 11 Honours subjects and 15 General subjects. We have set up one of the best library in the district with accumulation of around 40,000 books. In the year 2009, the institution established a study centre of distance learning (DODL) postgraduate courses under the affiliation of the University of Kalyani in which 4 PG courses are offered. The institution has also set up its own Computer Training Centre with a noble objective of providing computer literacy opportunity to its all students at a token cost.

Very recently, this esteemed institution has completed all formalities for setting up a study centre of distance learning (DODL) postgraduate courses under the affiliation of the Netaji Subhas Open University, as a result of which 8 PG courses will be offered from the forthcoming academic year.

Although we have been struggling with some serious issues like faculty and staff shortage, dearth of teaching rooms etc., still we sincerely believe that we will overcome all the obstacles for speeding light of higher education among the common mass of the region.

## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

#### CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

- > Sewnarayan Rameswar Fatepuria College is an undergraduate degree college affiliated to the University of Kalyani. Accordingly, the college strictly follows syllabi and curriculum as designed by its parent University.
- > Teachers make out and follow a planning of the curriculum on the basis of the designed syllabi of the parent University for executing the curriculum more interesting to the students.
- > All the three popular streams of subjects, *viz.* Science, Commerce and Arts, are presently taught by this esteemed institution with combined total of 11 Honours Subjects and 15 General Subjects.
- Presently, college has been offering 11 UG Honours Programmes, 3 UG General Programmes, 4 PG Distance Education Programmes and 1 Certificate Programme.
- > During last five academic years, the college introduced 4 new UG programmes, *viz.* Education General, Physics Honours, Arabic Honours and Environmental Science Honours.
- In the year 2009, the institution established a study centre of distance learning (DODL) postgraduate courses under the affiliation of the University of Kalyani, in which 4 PG Courses are offered.
- > The institution has also set up its own Computer Training Centre with a noble objective of providing computer literacy opportunity to its all students at a token cost.
- Very recently, this esteemed institution has signed a MOU for establishing a study centre of distance learning (DODL) postgraduate courses under the affiliation of the Netaji Subhas Open University, as a result of which 8 PG Courses will be offered from the forthcoming academic year.
- > Academic flexibility is offered by the college by offering 11 combinations in Arts stream, 3 combinations in Science stream and 1 combination in Commerce stream.
- > College is providing horizontal support for its students through introduction of different programs suggested and funded by the UGC, such as Entry in Service, Carrear Counselling, Remedial Coaching.
- > All the classrooms are equipped with interactive board. Few classrooms are equipped with microphone, projector and computer.
- > Students are encouraged to give their feedback about curriculum.
- > A few numbers of teachers are in the Board of Studies of the parent University.

#### **CRITERION II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION**

- > The college is giving best effort for overall development of its students.
- > The admission process in transparent. After declaration of 10 + 2 Examinations Results and keeping in view the relevant orders of the Higher Education Dept., Government of West Bengal, the important dates for admission process are publicized.
- > Online admission details, merit list and other necessary information are uploaded in college website and in notice board of the college for transparency.
- > The number of female students admitted to the 1st year classes of the college during the academic year 2014-15

was 1,042 as compared to male students 1,533. The ratio of the number of girls to boys was around 3 : 2. Thus, the institution nicely maintains gender balance in its classes.

- > The reservation policies of the Government are strictly maintained during admission. The total number of students admitted to the 1st year classes of the college during the academic year 2014-15 was 2,575, of which 111 students belong to SC category, 3 students belong to ST category and 392 students belong to OBC category.
- For ensuring and enriching academic matters of the college, an Academic Sub-committee has been formed by the Governing Body of the college with the composition of Heads of all departments and some other representatives of the Governing Body.
- > Teachers' Council of the college look after the academic affairs including preparation of class routine and conducting internal assessments of students.
- > Regular monitoring of attendance of the staff members and students is done.
- Remedial classes are taken for slow learners.
- College provides ICT tools for teachers who require demonstrating in the class.
- > The college organizes regular evaluation through class test examination. The students having practical based subjects are assessed on a regular basis.
- ➤ College possesses a rich Central Library containing more than 39,000 paper books.
- > The college library has acquired and installed SOUL 2.0 from the INFLIBNET Centre. To provide e-resources to researchers and faculty members, the college has subscribed for the NLIST programme undevwhich online access to 97,000+ ebooks and 6000+ full texts e-journals and periodicals can be made.
- > There are 16 Permanent Teachers, 13 Govt.-approved Part-time Teachers (PTTs), 9 Govt.-approved Contractual Whole-time Teachers (CWTTs), 14 Guest Teachers and 1 Permanent Librarian presently working in the college.
- Number of teachers holding Ph.D degree is 7 and 5 teachers are pursuing research for Ph.D dissertation.

  Number of teachers holding M.Phil degree is 6 and 13 teachers are NET / SET qualified.
- College owns around 65 usable computers with necessary accessories, 8 Laptops, 20 Printers, 3 Projectors, 4 Scanners and 8 Internet Connections in its different departments, sections and office.
- > Following stipends and scholarships are arranged and provided by the college to its economically backward students:

  - (ix) Labour Scholarship
- ➤ The college comprises of several wings, such as NSS, NCC, which take cares of sensitizing its students.

- > Seminars and special lectures are organised for advancement of knowledge.
- > Field Work and Study Tours are organized by the college for the departments which need so.

#### CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

- > The college encourage teachers to apply for research project grants, to participate in collaborative and research based extension programmes, to participate in seminars / conferences organised by different colleges and universities.
- > College provides infrastructure for carrying out research activities by the faculties. Presently, 3 faculty members are carrying out ongoing Minor Research Project (MRP) funded by the UGC.
- ➤ Access to e-journals and e-books has been made through N-list INFLIBNET. A rich research friendly library resource of 6000<sup>+</sup> e-journals and 97000<sup>+</sup> e-books through N-list has been made available for the students and the faculties.
- > The faculty members have published a good number research papers and articles in international, national and state journals.
- > The college teachers organize state level seminars in collaboration with other institutions.
- > Teachers are provided internet facility for conducting their research activities.
- NSS, NCC units of the college have conducted a number of extension activities inside and outside the college.

#### **❖** CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

- > The total campus area of college is 14, 244.93 sq.m and its built up area is 5,109.67 sq.m.
- > The college premise is under CCTV surveillance with 30 CC Cameras.
- > The college has a playground of its own and a gymnasium for physical education dept.
- The college has one seminar rooms with a seating capacity of 250 persons.
- > The college has constructed a Girls' Hostel having 50 intake capacities with the financial assistance of the UGC, which is to be inaugurated shortly.
- The college has its own computer training centre with 32 computers within the college premises.
- The library is regularly updated through purchase of books, magazines and journals. The library is automated with access to 97000+ e-books and 6000+ e-journals. As on date, the library has total 39,353 books in various subjects and 5,194 journals & periodicals.
- > The college has a Kirloskar Green generator of 30 KW capacity, 5 water cooler-cum-purifiers for providing pure and cold drinking water to the staff and students and one refrigerators in the canteen.
- > College has four laboratories for the Depts. of Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics and Geography. Infrastructures in the laboratories have been upgraded with financial assistance of the UGC and own fund of the college.
- > Students are provided with career counseling programs and training for entry in services.
- > The college has three NSS Units, which organizes various Social Awareness Programmes.
- > NCC is one of the remarkable wings of the Institution.
- > The college has an Employees' Credit Cooperative Society, which provides various kinds of loan to its staff

members within a short period.

- > In addition, the college set up study centres for Distance Learning PG courses under Kalyani University and Netaji Subhas Open University.

  In addition to this, regular classes are conducted by the Career Counselling Cell and coaching for competitive exams for entry in services is provided.
- > The college gymnasium provides opportunity for the students to access modern gadgets for body shaping and thus, aiming at mental as well as physical development of the students.
- > The college provides pure and cold drinking water to the students. The college canteen offers variety of food items to students at reasonable rates.
- > Students are encouraged to participate in various extracurricular and co-curricular activities in addition to their classroom activities. Students participate in various sports competitions at various levels and successful candidates are felicitated.

#### ❖ CRITERION VI : GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

- > The college is governed by its Governing Body (GB) formed as per Statute of the University of Kalyani and relevant Govt. Orders time to time. The GB is the policy making body of the institution which is headed under the president ship of the Hon'ble District Magistrate, District of Murshidabad.
- > The GB meets at regular intervals to monitor the smooth functioning of the college, to implement various relevant Govt. Orders and to initiate various developmental programmes of the institution.
- > The GB sanctions funds for maintenance as well as development programmes of the college. It ensures that various grants received from the Central and State Governments are effectively utilized.
- Various sub-committees are set up by the GB for decentralization of power and responsibilities. Sub-committees have the power to function independently and are duly authorized to implement their decisions.

well as non teaching staff on casual basis out of its own funds. Initiatives are taken to fill up the vacant teaching and non teaching posts sanctioned by the Government. It ensures that the Government regulations are strictly observed during such recruitment.

- (a) A meeting is centrally convened by the Academic Sub-committee before beginning of every Academic Session regarding effective implementation of curriculum as designed by the parent University.
- (b) Subsequently IQAC convene a meeting with all the departments of the college and provide a guideline to the Teachers' Council for preparing class routine.
- (c) Teachers' Council prepares the class routine and convene a meeting with all teaching staff for any inclusion, suggestion etc.
- (d) Based on the expertise of individual teachers, the syllabus is allotted to the concerned teacher by the respective Department.
- (e) The IQAC provides Departmental Diary and instructs all the departments to record their academic progress, which is reviewed by the IQAC time to time.
- (f) All the departments maintain the Departmental Diary incorporating topics and classes assigned to the individual teachers and their progress.

- 8. The college with the help of Students' Union organises annual literacy and cultural competitions, namely, 1. Debate, 2. Quiz, 3. Recitation, 4. News reading and announcing, 5. Drama, 6. Singing etc to develop their aesthetic qualities.


- 2.1.1 How does college ensure publicity and transparency in admission process?

#### 2.2 CATERING TO STUDENT DIVERSITY

## 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The College has always offered a favourable environment to differently abled students. The Institution strictly follows all Government rules and regulations regarding admission of the differently-abled students. They are given special guidance and counselling by the teachers of the respective departments. There is a provision of ramp in the college to allow convenient movement of differently-abled students. Generally most of the classes are arranged in ground floor and all official work is carried out in the ground floor for these students.

## 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, before the commencement of a new session a Navin Baran Utsob is carried out every year along with the Students Union. Senior professors and teacher-in-charge address the students to acquaint them with academic and non-academic programmes in the College. In this programme some eminent personalities interact with the students and share their experiences which obviously provide a useful boost to motivate our students. In this programme the new students get the opportunity to interact among themselves and also with the senior students in festive environment. Immediately after the commencement of class, basic knowledge and shortcomings of students are judged by the teachers through one to one interaction. The teachers usually spend a few classes for recapitulation of the previous subject matters to bridge the gap, if any.

## 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Most of the students admitted hail from rural areas and almost all of them are first generation learner. They face learning difficulties especially due their lack of communicative skills in English. Teachers make personal contact sessions for advancement of the slow learners. Personalised interaction with the teachers helps the students to eliminate their weak points. The teachers guide them to prepare the model answers by providing books, reading materials and advice. Remedial classes are conducted for SC, ST and OBC students under UGC funds. Special classes are held in various subjects to help the academically weak students. Students with inadequate language skills are advised to join communication skill programmes. To facilitate better understanding of course content bilingual method of teaching is adopted where necessary.

### 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

Students and staff of the College are sensitised on different issues in various manners.

- Various activities are organised by the NSS Unit of the College throughout the year like cleaning of the
  College campus, awareness programme in slum areas in which students and teachers actively participate.

  "Brikhyaropon" (festival of plantation of trees) is observed every year in the College campus.
- Blood Donation Camp is organized almost every year in our Campus in which teacher and students participate the camp actively.
- Various social awareness programmes like World Aids Day, World Women Day etc. are observed in the college.
- In September 2013, Department of Philosophy organized a UGC sponsored Two –Day State Level Seminar on "Ethical Values in Modern Society A Reconstruction".
- The College caters exclusively to the educational needs of women. A women Hostel has been constructed to provide accommodation for women students coming from remote area.
- The institution is an inclusive one where there is no discrimination made on the basis of religion, caste, ethnicity, region, language, social status etc.

### 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Advanced learners are identified through tests, seminars, debates and assignments by most of the departments. In order to help the advanced learners to improve their aptitude and other talents, they are encouraged to participate in seminar presentation, quiz competition, debates etc. in other colleges and institutes where they can excel themselves in the fields of their interest. The advanced learners are motivated to take care of the slow learners by organizing them into a small study groups. They are encouraged to study the latest books to enrich their knowledge. Coaching for entry into Services under UGC sponsored Add – on Course is also provided to the advanced learners.

# 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (student from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

All relevant information of admitted students is preserved in the College office. Results of College and University examinations are preserved in the College office as well as in the respective departments. Students' progressions are maintained in their departments. Depending on the socio-economic status, the rate of drop out students in this College is not very low. Due to large number this is very tough to take special care for slow learners and students from economically weaker sections so that they can gradually cope with the University Examination. Most of departments give remedial education for slow learners. They are encouraged to keep individual contact with the teachers. Taking into the strength and weakness, the slow learners are given additional support whenever possible. The teachers take individual care to remove their difficulties in understanding the subject matters. A number of ways are adopted for their support both financially and socially keeping in mind that education for women is very important in our country.

- To maintain the parity with the national commitment for inclusion of the socially weaker section of the society, along with the advantage of reservation stipends and scholarships sponsored by the State Government and UGC are awarded to the students of SC/ST and OBC categories.
- Students from the Minority community avail stipends sponsored by Minority Affairs Department of the Govt. of West Bengal.
- Stipends for Differently-abled students are arranged from WEST Bengal Labour Welfare Board.
- *Kanyashree* Scholarships offered by the State Government to the deserving girl students have been introduced from the current academic year.
- The College extends financial assistance by giving concessions for BPL Students.

Apart from this, expenditure incurred for field study to needy students is also provided. The College also encourages its students through various prizes, some of which have been initiated several decades ago.

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#### 2.3. TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

#### 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules?

(Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

- Preparation of the academic calendar for the next academic year begins in July i.e. before the end of every academic year under the supervision of IQAC.
- A central class-wise timetable is prepared by the Routine Committee for the next academic year by the time table committee towards the end of every academic year and distributed in advance to all the departments.
- Utilization of syllabus is prepared by concerned departments in every academic year.
- Every teacher is given a diary before the commencement of the academic year for recording all data regarding teaching and learning.

- Organizing workshops to enhance use of ICT facilities to improve teaching-learning process.
- Encouraging teachers to use different methods for teachings.

- Activating and facilitating all the committees of the college with regard to performance and provide support to the teachers for their academic, administrative and research endeavours.
- Monitoring academic activities throughout the year through frequent meetings with Heads of various departments and suggesting means for quality sustenance and enhancement.
- Collecting feedback from students.
- Motivating faculty members to participate in various seminars, workshops and conferences to enrich their knowledge.

- Useful efforts are made to make the learning student-centric. Activities like group discussions and presentations enable the students to come up with innovative ideas.
- Right from the beginning of the session, they are guided and motivated which channelizes their energy in the best possible positive manner.
- Independent learning is encouraged by giving them assignments which intensifies their learning.
- Career development counseling cell plays a major role in reinforcing their skills by providing them continual support in terms of grooming and making them more employable.
- Teaching methods are adopted as per the requirement of the prescribed curriculum. Interactive methods
  are used to discuss fundamental concepts and students are encouraged to ask questions.

 Students watch films on social issues, make posters and enact street plays based on contemporary social problems.

#### **Supportive structure for Teachers:**

- Computers with internet facility only for office.
- Photocopy facility available in library for students and teachers.

- Similarly, participation in 'Project Work' undertaken by students in various subjects in UG programme.

The teachers are motivated for increasing use of power point presentations as one of the most attractive and visual forms of classroom teaching.

Use of projectors is an integral part of the teaching-learning process.

Study tours are organized which is considered as an ingenious teaching methodology to give practical exposure to the students.

Every department imparts innovative methods for teaching like ICT, maps, charts and hands on training. Apart from this, use of film, documentaries, posters, songs are also using for interesting and effective teaching.

#### 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The S.R.F. college library has more than 40,000 books and 15 journals and periodicals and also many competitive knowledge books. The library committee of the college looks after the purchase of books and journals every year. The Library committee collects the requisitions for the purchase of books from the departments to augment the basic resources for teaching-learning process. There has been an addition of 2000 books/ reference books in the past four years.

The college also provides personal ID to faculty members for accessing INFLIBNET site that offers more than 80,000 e-books and 3,000 e-journals in full text form.

From library question bank, magazine, newspaper and reference books are also available to all students.

- The college faces the challenges of completing the syllabus in the stipulated time. Part-time, Guest & Contractual professors are appointed to address this problem.
- To foster the holistic development of students, many extra-curricular activities are organized which may result in incompletion of the syllabus. But the college makes sure it is completed by taking extra classes.

- The IQAC collects feedback from various departments and take necessary steps to ameliorate the quality of teaching learning.
- The academic results of the students are analyzed which helps in evaluating the quality of teaching.

- After completion of every module IQAC organized class tests with MCQ of 50 marks in every honours subject.
- Feedback for all subjects/ classes/ teachers is assessed by the IQAC and a report is prepared and submitted to the TIC.





The initiatives developed by college to enhance social and economic relevance as well as to enhance student learning are as follows:

- The College NSS Units has played an important role in propagating social awareness amongst students by networking with neighbourhood communities and other social organizations and helped the students to understand social problems. There is participation of students in campaigns on various health, gender, sexual abuse and environmental issues. These types of joint ventures have helped the college/students in understandings the needs of society in general and created awareness among students in particular.
- The CDCC takes initiatives to inform the students about different career opportunities prepare them to face interviews. Every year 50-60 students benefited.

Although there is no recognized research centre, the college has the provision of well-equipped laboratories for Science and Mathematics Department where the research activities have been carried out.

The RPC has taken following initiatives for enhancement of research activities in the college:

- Identify potential researchers who are eligible for undertaking research.
- Conduct meeting on regular basis with faculties, librarian and other support staff to disseminate research

related information like funding agencies, preparation of research proposals, ethical issues, plagiarism, submission of reports and audited statements of expenditure for different types of projects, databases and impact factor of journals.

Following results are found of the initiatives taken by RPC:

- Increased participation and submission of research projects to different funding agencies like UGC and DST by the faculty.
- Increased participation with Presentation (Oral/Poster) in different seminars of national and international levels.
- Substantial increase in submission and approval of minor research projects.
- Increased the number of publications of faculties in peer-reviewed journals of national/ international level.

## 3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/ projects?

#### (a) Autonomy to the Principal investigator:

- The principal investigators of different research projects are given freedom to carry out and complete their project with good outcomes.
- Principal investigators are permitted to purchase equipments and instruments as their needs for their investigations.

#### (b) Timely availability or release of resources:

- College authority always permits to use the resources to the principal investigators of different research projects.
- The RPC convener monitors the requirements and procurement of instruments and facilities required for the research project.

#### (c) Adequate infrastructure and human resources

- The college provides sufficient space for research, infrastructure and assistance needed for Research oriented activities.
- Departmental laboratories are made easily available for research.
- Departmental Laboratories are continuously up-graded.

#### (c) Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers:

• Duty leave is sanctioned to teachers to participate in seminar, conferences etc.

- (e) Support in terms of technology and information needs:
  - The RPC plays important role in overall conduct of research activities in the college.
  - Each Lab based department is enriched with high speed broadband internet facility which helps the
    researchers to get information and knowledge required in their respective areas of interest.
  - Wi-Fi facility is available only in the Accounts section of the college to help the researchers of all departments.
  - Central Library subscribes journals for different subjects.
- (f) Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities:
  - RPC and Principal Investigators of different research projects submit utilization certificate and audited statement expenditure to the funding agencies timely.

There is no provision for the separate budget of State Government for funding research work of colleges. However, a part of the plan expenditure of the State Govt. and Development Grant of UGC are used to purchase equipments which are used for research and development purpose in addition to the requirement of the curriculum. The college is enriched with library, instruments, laboratories, computers, internets. The freedom is given to teachers to make best use of this infrastructure to carry out their research work. Grant from UGC, ICSSR, DST etc. provide finance for research as shown in Table 3.1.5A.





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# **Criterion VI: Governance, Leadership and Management**

# **6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership**

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

- To motivate the students to participate in various extracurricular activities like N.S.S., N.C.C. etc. along with their academic educational activities.

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# 6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

- The top management of the institution is the Governing Body (GB). The GB seeks a regular, comprehensive and strategic plan and suggestion from the Principal / Teacher-in-charge (TIC) about the overall development of the college. Such plans are presented by the Principal / TIC containing the perspective vision, planning and implementation of initiatives for the future.
- After getting requisite approval of the plan placed before the GB, the Principal / Teacher-in-charge of the
  institution executes said plan with the help of teaching and non-teaching staff of the college.
- The IQAC of the college is actively involved in the design and implementation of quality policy of the
  college through its meetings, recommendations, data collection and storage, observation of evolving trends
  in Higher Education and planning institutional activities accordingly.
- Several sub-committees are formed under the leadership of the Principal / TIC of the college to continuously guide, monitor, and assess the execution of various activities as planned and scheduled.

## 6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring?

The policies and action plans of the leadership of the college for fulfilment of the foretasted mission are:

- Required action plans are sought from the institution by the Governing Body. This is done through the agenda of the meeting of the GB. The Principal / Teacher-in-charge is the ex-officio member of the Governing Body and acts as the bridge between the GB and other stakeholders.
- Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan are done in the meeting of the GB.
- The leadership observes whether all areas of institutional development, consisting of curricular, cocurricular and extra-curricular domains, have been given due importance in the action plan. According to the instructions of the GB, the action plans for all operations are prepared by the institution and the same is implemented in the institution in due course of time.

# Interaction with stakeholders :

- The college management takes into account the views of all stakeholders (*i.e.* employees, students, parents, alumni, representatives from the public etc.) for all the relevant decisions. These views of the stakeholders are obtained through the constant interaction of the Principal / TIC, representatives of the GB and Teachers with the various stakeholders.
- Proper support for planning and policy implementation is done through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders.
- Meetings on regular basis with teaching and non-teaching staff, students' representatives and representatives of the students' guardians are conducted by the TIC on regular intervals.
- IQAC, Academic Sub-committee and Teachers' Council hold meeting on regular basis for designing and implementing academic issues.

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## > Reinforcing the culture of appreciation of excellence :

The leadership continuously nurtures and reinforces appreciation of excellences by rewarding achievements through a number of scholarships, concessions and merit prizes for the students. For faculty, there are several welfare schemes like advance salary payment (for new faculties), festival advance and exgratia for non-teaching staff, etc., and provision of opportunities for advanced learning of the faculties.

# 6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

- Periodic review meetings are organized at various levels to monitor and evaluate policies regarding quality, implementation of decisions of the management and the Government, curriculum delivery, improving various processes and procedures etc.
- Regular feedback system at various levels from all the stakeholders also helps in this regard.

## 6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

- In consultation with the higher authorities of the college, the management of the institution provides academic leadership to the faculty through well-structured systems and procedures.
- The management also provides ample opportunities for acquiring higher qualifications, pursuing research activities and excelling at all levels of institutional operations.
- Complete transparency and adherence to rules are maintained while promoting faculty to higher positions, assigning important duties, etc.
- The management provides absolute autonomy to the Principal / TIC and teachers in matters of academic decisions and innovation is always encouraged by the management.

# 6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

- Besides the management, the direct leadership of the college lies with the Principal / TIC and the Teachers'
   Council of the institution.
- Various committees are constituted involving teachers and non-teaching staff which directly take care of
  implementation of various policies of the management. Senior faculty, by virtue of their experience and
  wisdom, are made conveners of important committees, such as IQAC, Anti-Ragging Committee, Academic
  Sub-committee, Research and Publication Committee, etc.
- Heads of the Department are provided leadership to ensure smooth conduct of classes, curriculum implementation, conduct of tests etc. on time as per the Academic Calendar of the college.
- Student leadership is ensured through election and subsequent inclusion of the elected students in different committees, so that they are involved in decision making.

# 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

- Though the top management supervises the design of plans and policies, the actual governance of
  the institutional affairs is brought through a decentralized system which gives autonomy to various
  departments at operational levels.
- The Principal / TIC is the highest authority in the college. The Principal / TIC has all the administrative and financial powers, although financial approval by the GB / Finance Sub-committee is necessary to purchases over a certain amount. Financial autonomy for all routine operations within the budget approved by the top management, all external correspondence, co-ordination with regulatory bodies and affiliating University are the privileges of the Principal / TIC. Principal / TIC is in charge of appraisal and is the disciplining authority.

### 6.2. STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT AND DEPLOYMENT

# 6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

- The quality policy of the institution is to sustain and enhance the overall quality through bringing about positive developments in areas of teaching and learning, research, infrastructure, student progression and governance.
- The quality policy of the institution is developed by the IQAC in consultation with the Principal / TIC, the Teachers' Council and the representatives of the non-teaching staff and students' union.
- The IQAC is committed to follow the principles enunciated by the NAAC for achievement of quality, its sustenance and enhancement.
- The quality policy is driven through the TIC, HODs, faculty members and supporting staff. It is deployed through financial, academic and administrative operations that benefit all the stakeholders. The quality policy is reviewed from time to time based on feedback from different stakeholders and accordingly, the changes are incorporated in the policy.

# 6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

The institution's development is elaborated through the perspective plan. It includes extension of building and class rooms, providing additional facilities, introduction of new courses, employing teachers from the own fund of the college etc. Different sub-committees are formed to facilitate smooth academic growth and infrastructure

development of the college. The members of these committees consider several factors while preparing future plans. Some aspects considered for inclusion in the plan are:

- Widen the scope and range of the courses offered by introducing more subjects at the UG level.
- Introduce viable and relevant carrier oriented /skill development courses.
- Enhance ICT based teaching in departments.
- Purchase more Books, Journals and modern Laboratory equipments.
- Encouragement of Research and Publications.
- Instigate more extension activities.

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### 6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following:

### Teaching & Learning:

- The quality of the teaching-learning process depends on two inter-related points: (a) on the teaching ability of the teachers; and (b) on the intake ability of the students. The teachers are recruited by the State Government through West Bengal College Service Commission. The teaching ability of an in-service teacher is further improved by the participation of the teachers in Orientation Programmes and Refresher Courses. Besides these, the qualities of teachers are increased by their continuous research activities. The college is situated in a remote location and most of the students are admitted as the first generation learner and having heterogeneous intake ability. However, the college introduces on-line admission process to implement a transparent and equity based admission process with proper vigilance until the admission process ends. In order to overcome the said heterogeneity of students, teachers specially guide the weaker students beyond the class hours.
- Every year the college increases intake capacity in different subjects to accommodate more students, which on the one hand, helps to exploit its infrastructure and resources lowering the unit cost of education, but creates a pressure on the quality on the other.
- Students from the low income family are given support by way of sanctioning full and half free studentships. The college arrange many other stipends and scholarships awarded from various Government and Non-Government organizations.
- The college has commenced new courses in Physics Honours, Environmental Science Honours, Arabic Honours and Education General in its undergraduate studies. The college pays special attention while introducing a new subject so that the academic standard becomes unquestionable.
- This college has already been running one Distance Learning Centre under the Kalyani University for PG Courses in four subjects. Very recently, this esteemed institution has completed all formalities for setting up a study centre of distance learning (DODL) postgraduate courses under the affiliation of the Netaji Subhas Open University, as a result of which 8 PG courses will be offered from the forthcoming academic year. Our faculty members are involved in various academic activities of these Study Centres.

## Research & Development:

- The college is very much aware of the various developmental programmes for its teaching staff and students. Different departments regularly take initiative to arrange internal seminars and workshops on different current issues.
- The college also encourages faculties to participate in Refresher Courses and Orientation Programmes and in Seminars, Workshops, Symposiums; and also to stay updated and share their research findings.
- The teaching staffs are increasingly bringing in research projects from different funding agencies.

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 Teachers publish books and their papers on current issues of research in international and national peer reviewed journals bearing evidence of academic contribution of this college to the global knowledge base.

# Community engagement :

- The Institution has three strong NSS units: NSS Unit I and NSS Unit II and NSS Unit III. These units are
  involved in various community works around the year contributing social awareness. It adopts various
  villages where health and blood donation camps are organized.
- The college helps to arrange conducting various public examinations. The teachers and non-teaching staff of the college extend their active participation to conduct those examinations.
- Distance Education Study Centre of this college plays a major role to continue study of innumerable dropout and working candidates of the locality.

### Human Resource Management :

- The TIC provides continuous feedback to the teachers and finds ways to provide them with professional development opportunities, both in-house and off campus.
- Feedback from students helps in identification of the shortcomings on the part of a teacher or staff. Once
  the gaps or lacunas are identified, appropriate strategies are planned for closure of the gaps and removal of
  the mismatches. This ultimately improves the basis purpose and outcomes of teaching-learning.
- The TIC encourages and motivates the faculty members for undertaking research and extension activities.
- The non-teaching staff are also assessed by the concerned department and the TIC also takes adequate care to examine the performances of the staff. The TIC interacts, when required, for the improvement of the performances of these staff members. During their promotion or placement to higher scale of pay, the Principal / TIC has to send their performance report to the Director of Public Instruction, Govt. of West Bengal.

### > Industry interaction :

# 6.2.5. How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

- All official letters, requests, proposals, reports are prepared through a run-through session involving management representatives, TIC, faculty members, non-teaching staff and students which are conveyed to the top management through proper channels.
- "Feedback Forms" are circulated amongst students which help the TIC to identify and assess the problems.
- The College has its Grievance Redressal Cell and Students' Union which also provide the authority with valuable information on various matters related to students' interest.
- The feedback obtained from external examiners of practical examination of the University on the occasion
  of their visit to the college often help the authority about the need of the hour and also to review the
  activities and determine the priority list of actions.

# 6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process?

- Both, teaching and non-teaching staff, are involved in various activities in order to improve the efficiency of the college. The college authority always tries to provide support to the teachers for academic development of the students. There is no provision for award of prizes to teachers for their innovative teaching, but the innovative teaching of the teachers help a student for better result in university examination and to singe in life. This motivates teachers for involvement in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the college.
- In the process of improvement of college administration, a vital role is played by the non-teaching staff. The non-teaching staffs are directly involved in providing various services. The authority arrange for special training sessions for them whenever required, *e.g.* during the introduction of Online admission or introduction of COSA software in the college.

# 6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

Resolutions of the Governing Body and Finance Committee are made available in the GB Resolution Book and Finance Committee Resolution Book and can be examined during the Peer Team Visit. These resolutionss are too large and do not fit into the format of the SSR.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy toan affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

There is no such application for autonomy.

6.2.9. How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyse the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The institution has a Grievance Redressal Cell. The college has installed a Complaint or Suggestion Box, where students, teachers, employees and other stakeholders may drop their grievances or complaints or suggestions. The cell functions:

- To make every stakeholders of the college aware of their rights, powers and responsibilities .
- To invite written complaints/grievances of any kind.
- To redress the problems of the aggrieved through its own machinery.
- To refer any serious problem for necessary administrative action to the TIC.

# 6.2.10. During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute?

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Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these.

No court case has been filed against the college during the last four years.

6.2.11. Does the institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

- The feedback of the Students' Union on day-to-day performance of the institution provides information regarding the functioning of the different components of the institution.
- The Principal / TIC regularly meets the Secretary of the Students' Union and conveners of different sub-committees. The feedback, particularly from the staff and students, are utilized for decision making and performance improvement. Teachers' Council resolves different decisions and suggestions which are placed before the Principal for implementation.

### **6.3 FACULTY EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES**

# 6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

- The teachers regularly participate in Orientation Programmes and Refresher Courses conducted by different UGC HRDC / Academic Staff Colleges of the Universities.
- The teachers are encouraged to be members of PG and UG Board of Studies of the affiliating and other
   Universities and also to be the Head Examiner, Examiner, Scrutinizer, Paper Setter, Moderator of
   different Universities and other educational institutes.
- The teachers are also appointed as co-coordinators of Kalyani Distance Education Study Centre and Netaji Subhash Open University Study Centre of the college.
- For financial work, non-teaching staff have been trained for the use of Tally software, COSA software and e-Bantan system.
- Most of the Group-C staff members are computer literate.
- Office management customized software for collection of students' fees and for mainlining students'
  database has been installed and are being used in the administration management system of the
  college.
- Tally ERP software is installed in the accounts section of the college and used for accounting works.

# 6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

For the promotion of teachers through CAS, they are encouraged to participate in refresher courses and
orientation courses. Teachers are being released ensuring that their classes will be taken by the rest of the
faculty members so that students are not being deprived from their regular classes.

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- Teachers are provided on-duty leave to attend NSS training programmes of the University of Kalyani.
- To the teachers, the major motivating factor is the success of their students. The acceptance of research article by peer reviewed international journals motivates teaching staff to more involvement in research activities. College authority always try to provide updated research facilities like rooms, equipments, journals, internet facilities etc. which encourages the faculty to participate in higher level research.
- The non-teaching staffs are overburdened with their jobs due to staff shortage and as a result, there is very little scope to release them to participate in any training program.

# 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

- The performance of the teachers are evaluated by: (i) the departmental heads; (ii) the feedbacks from current students; and (iii) the IQAC. The teachers are advised to maintain self appraisal reports in prescribed "daily dairy". They also provide self-appraisal reports (PBAS) as prescribed by the UGC and it should be approved by the IQAC and the screening committee as per the relevant Government Order at the time of promotion through CAS.
- Since most non-teaching staffs work according to the instructions of the Principal / TIC and the Bursar, the performances of them are evaluated by the Principal / TIC and the Bursar. There is scope of CAS for non-teaching staff as well. They are evaluated by the Principal / TIC in accordance with the prescribed proforma issued by the DPI, West Bengal.

# 6.3.4. What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The Governing body or TIC can issue "Show Cause" letter of any allegation against teaching or non-teaching staff.

# 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The available welfare schemes for the teaching and non-teaching staff are stated as under:

- For the night guard of the college, there is a provision for residential quarters. College Guest House is made available for the other teaching and non-teaching staff in case of emergency only.
- The institution assists its employees to get access of various loans, such as house building loan, computer loan, vehicle purchase loan etc., from Banks.
- There is an Employees Credit Cooperative Society in which permanent full-time teaching and nonteaching staffs are only eligible to become members. Short-term as well as long-term loans are granted by the credit society for various purposes, such as for purchase / construction of house, education, medical treatment etc.

• The non-teaching staffs are offered bonus and Advance Salary during the festival season.

### 6.3.6. What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

Since it is a Government-aided institution, the TIC and the Governing Body of the College have no power to attract or retain any full-time faculty. However, after retirement of any eminent teacher, if there is scarcity of teachers in the respective department, the college can re-engage them as Guest Lecturer with a token honorarium for their service. The college authority encourages application of administrative skills of the faculties by a token additional honourarium out of its own fund. To attract skilled and qualified faculties, advertisement for Guest Lecturers is placed in print media with proper job-descriptions.

# 6.4. FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND RESOURCE MOBILIZATION

#### 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

- The Governing Body (GB) of the college has formed Finance Committee and several sub-committees, consisting of its representatives and members of the teaching and/or non- teaching staff, to ensure and to monitor effective and efficient use of financial of resources.
- Regarding construction of building, Building Sub-committee recommends details of construction of building required along with plan and estimate which are placed before the Finance Committee for fund allocation and approval. Such approval of the Finance Committee is finally approved by the GB.
- Regarding various purchases of substantial amount, the issue is placed before the Purchase Subcommittee after getting allocation and approval of fund by the Finance Committee which is subject to final approval of the GB.
- Regarding purchase of Books and Journals for the Library, the issue is placed before the Library Subcommittee after getting allocation and approval of fund by the Finance Committee.
- The college has a practice of budgeting for all expenses and following the budget allocation restrictions strictly for spending under different heads, so that a sound, economical but efficient use of financial resources is achieved.
- Collection of fees from students and other collections are directly deposited into the Bank Account of the college.
- Salary Grant-in-aid received from the State Govt. is billed through the COSA software.
- Salary to staff is paid through direct credit of the bank account of the incumbent.
- Records of purchases, daily collection, bill and cheque registers, stock books, scholarship registers etc. are duly maintained by the college office.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

Internal checking system is made through a cross checking mechanism system consisting of cashier, accountant, bursar, cheque signatory GB member and the TIC. All cash receipts are duly deposited into the bank on the same day of college. Payments are made through cheque and withdrawing cash from the bank. For each payment, vouchers are prepared by the accountant and placed before the Bursar and TIC for approval. After approval, cheque is drawn and sent to the signatory GB member. Finally payment is made through the cashier.

External audit is done for the each financial year by the auditor as appointed by the State Govt. The external audit of the college up to the financial year 2011-12 has so far been completed. External audit for the financial years 2012-13, 2013-14 and 2014-15 are in process and will be completed shortly.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts / funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and reserve fund / corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major sources of the institutional receipts are the grant-in-aid received from the state government for payment of staff salary and for other non-recurring purposes, UGC and collection from students. 50% of the tuition fees received from the students is to be refunded to the State Govt. and balance 50% is retained by the college for paying staff salaries appointed by the GB. The college also receives The audited statements of accounts for each of the previous four financial years are made available in the college office and can be examined during the Peer Team Visit. These statements are too large and do not fit into the format of the SSR.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

Apart from the regular sources of income, the college explores alternative sources of additional funding in form of non-recurring grant-in-aid from various regulatory bodies. The college procures additional funding from the UGC for academic affairs, from the Central / State Govt and non-govt agencies for students' scholarship affairs and from the affiliating University for extra-curricular affairs.

# **6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)**

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Yes. The college has established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) on 19.11.2014. The college IQAC has played vital role in designing/ framing and implementing the policies of the college. The institutional policy with regard to quality assurance is as follows:

- Motivation and appreciation of teachers to develop professional skills and encourage them to conduct research.
- The IQAC plays a more active role to motivate the faculty members and students to realize the targets while fulfilling regular academic obligations.
- The IQAC assists the (Teacher in Charge) TIC in following up with government authorities for erstwhile rules and regulations and issues like funding for infrastructural development.
- The IQAC and the Governing Body are always responsive and supportive for the various programs.
- Involve in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and contribute to overall development of students.
- Develop innovative teaching methods with use of modern technology.
- Sharing of resources and infrastructure for their optimal utilization.
- Systematic efforts to mobilize resources, which enhance the quality of the institution.
- Implementation of systems and processes that has increased efficiency of institutional academic and administrative processes.
- Enhanced teacher participation in research, which is evident in the number of projects funded by various funding agencies and publications of faculties in various reputed peer reviewed international journals.
- Development and establishment of special infrastructure in terms of high end equipment, laboratory infrastructure, software, high computing machines for professional programmes etc.
- Focus on development of e-resources and its integration in classroom teaching.
- Practical Support to teachers and students in all their endeavours leading to excellence in education.

# b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/ authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

IQAC and TIC interact regularly with regard to academics as well as administrative issues. There is also considerable time spent on discussing and implementing new schemes for teachers and students. Some of the decisions approved by the management are as follows:

• Implementation of "teacher's diary".

- Feedback system on teaching for all programmes.
- Major and minor infrastructural changes in science laboratories for their effective utilization.
- Submission of research projects, settlement of accounts and auditing, purchases to be made through research schemes and other grants/ schemes.
- Initiative taken for Promotion and placement of faculties through CAS. PBAS and API score are scrutinized by IQAC and provide advice for needful correction.

# C. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes. The IQAC is composed by thirteen members in which three are external member, namely Prof. Geetali Bera, Prof. Gopal Pal and Prof. Badsha Jahangir.

- The external experts help the college IQAC in terms of understanding the concepts of academic autonomy.
- They also provide valuable suggestions for improvement in the overall functioning of the IQAC.

# d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

- The IQAC is composed by 13 members in which two are alumni members. ( Prof. Gopal Pal and Prof. Badsha Jahangir). They constantly provide support to IQAC to coordinate for various aspects regarding the overall development of the quality of the institution.
- The present students give direct feedback (although in an informal way) on the academic and infrastructural needs. This feedback has helped in enhancing the quality of the academic and administrative processes.

# e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

- IQAC has organized different Meeting with faculties of the college to discuss different aspects for development of the academic and research environment of the college.
- The IQAC is responsible for monitoring all the institutional processes. The IQAC communicates with other
   Statutory and Non Statutory sub-Committees and also evaluates their performance.
- If need arises, the composition of certain committees is altered for achieving the objectives of the committee.
- It also helps the Research and Publication Committee in dissemination information with respect to research schemes, orientation of researchers and effective operational processes.
- It also communicates with the heads of the department and participates in academic and administrative decision making process.
- Procedural and practical support is provided to teachers in any academic and administrative process/ procedure.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

The IQAC and different subcommittees is in charge of ensuring quality in all academic and administrative activities of the institution. IQAC collects input from all departments and the stakeholders. In addition, IQAC also collects feedback, formally as well as informally, from various stakeholders. Recommendations are made by the IQAC to the Principal and actions are taken accordingly. Besides IQAC, different Committees have been formed which take all the necessary steps/actions for successful implementation of the plan/decisions and provide feedback to the Forum for monitoring the activities.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

No such measures have been taken in this regard.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

No formal provision for Academic Audit has been introduced yet. However, external review of academic quality is ensured in the following ways:

- Papers of many teachers have been published in refereed journals. Many teachers have received funds for research works.
- For the students class tests and tutorials are held and students' seminars are organized. The first year students of all the departments submit projects on environmental studies.
- For socially and economically backward students the institution provides remedial coaching and coaching in entry-in-services.

# 6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies / regulatory authorities?

- The IQAC works smoothly with the Governing Body, and gets support and cooperation from the Department of Higher Education, West Bengal and the UGC.
- The Governing Body, the highest advisory body gives advice and support to the institution from time to time.
- The University Grants Commission has extended its hands to this institution for high standard of teaching and research.

### details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

- The departmental teachers monitor the performance of the students by their response in the classrooms as well as by their performance in the class tests conducted by the department.
- The Principal ensures effective teaching-learning process in the college by constant interaction with the Departmental Heads and with individual teachers, as and when required. In every Teachers Council meeting the broad discussion is made in this regard also.
- The IQAC also suggests the departments the effective methods to be adopted for teaching-learning process. The performance of the teachers gets reflected in the Annual Quality Assurance Report.
- Assessments of feedbacks from different stakeholders like the students and the Students' Union, parents, Alumni Association also help the process of monitoring the teaching-learning in the college.

# 6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

- The IQAC generally communicates its policies and decisions to various stakeholders through notices and letters.
- Regular meetings are held among teachers and students on various important issues like admission, examination, cultural programme, beautification, games and sports (both indoor and outdoor).
- There are inter departmental and intra departmental meetings.
- The meetings are also held with the members of the non-teaching staff.
- Notices are posted on the notice board, notice book and in many cases in the college website.
- For quality assurance students can get the help of Career Counselling Cell, Anti-Ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell and the like.
- The Alumni Association and the guardians are contacted as and when required.

# **Criterion VII: Innovation and Best Practices**

# 7.1. Environmental Consciousness:

### 7.1.1. Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Although the institution doesn't conduct any formal Green Audit Program of its campus and facilities, but it often takes many initiatives to ensure an eco-friendly green campus. Quite often, tree plantation drives are organized by the NSS Dept. of the college. College sincerely maintains its gardens in front and in the institution. A gardener has been appointed by the Governing Body of the college for well keeping of its gardens. Use of plastic is avoided in the college campus. Dustbin pots are placed at various location of the college for waste materials, which are regularly cleaned.

## 7.1.2 Eco friendly Initiatives

The institution takes special efforts on regular basis for developing and spreading environmental awareness amongst its students and nearby people through its wide range of activities, such as environment-friendly and eco-friendly campaigns, organizing seminars, poster exhibitions, street lectures, field visits etc. Efforts have also been made to institutionalize some of the environmentally sustainable practices in the college.

The college has taken following initiatives to make the campus eco-friendly:

- Energy Conservation: The college has taken initiative to make the campus fully enabled with CFL and LED for energy conservation.
- Use of Renewable Energy: Governing body of the college recently passed a resolution for installation of Solar Power Generation Plant in the college.
- Effort for carbon utility: Regular plantation of plants and trees, regular maintenance of gardens, preservation of old trees, declaring the college campus plastic free zone.
- Plantation: Every year tree plantation program is organized by college NSS and NCC Dept. of the college.
- Hazardous waste management: For waste management, a tie up is made with local municipality.
- E-waste management: For e-waste management, the college has not yet been adopted any specific measure, but it takes the matter into its due consideration and remedial measure will be adopted in near future.

# **7.2. INNOVATIONS:**

- ➤ Introduction of UGC funded Remedial Courses for SC, ST and OBC students, Career Counselling Course and Entry in Services Course in 2010.
- Organization of Value Based Educational lectures and programs.
- Organizing environment-friendly and eco-friendly campaigns on regular basis.

## 7.3. BEST PRACTICES:

#### 7.3.1. Two Best Practices

> FIRST BEST PRACTICE : Computer literacy program for all students at token cost

#### **★** GOAL:

The noble objective of the program is to spread computer literacy among the students of the college, as most of them are first generation learners.

### **★** THE CONTEXT:

The locality of Beldanga has an enormous population of economically backward and illiterate peasants and labourers together with few educated middle class people. Most of the students who come to this institution for acquiring their higher education degree are first generation learners. Being economically backward, these students are not well equipped with the modern technological knowledge. For making all students capable enough to cope up with the modern technological system, the institution has set up its own Computer Training Centre with a noble objective of providing computer literacy opportunity to its all students at a token cost.

#### **★** THE PRACTICE:

Under this program, basic computer literacy courses are taught at minimum fees structure along with some advanced computer courses. After successful completion, certificate of participation and completion of the course is issued to students for their future career advancement purposes.

### **★ PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED**

Following problems have been faced by the institution for implementing above program:

- 1. Inadequate funds;
- 2. Apathy of reputed computer training agencies to extend hands of cooperation;
- 3. Discouragement of students from the part of outside training centres;
- 4. Lack of qualified faculties in the locality.
- 5. Lack of skilled non-teaching staff.

# > SECOND BEST PRACTICE: "Healthy Youth for Healthy India" Program by N.S.S. Dept.

# **★** GOAL:

- To create health awareness among the students and nearby villagers.
- To create hygiene and sanitation awareness among the students and nearby villagers.
- To create a sense of social responsibility.
- To engage the students in meaningful service that meets community needs.
- To materialize NSS slogan "not me, but you".

### **★** THE CONTEXT:

Most of the rural people residing at nearby villages are the peasantry class and economically backward. They have also been deprived from light of higher education. They are not even conscious enough regarding their health. The institution observed utility to make them aware of heath consciousness, particularly regarding mother's health and child care. To meet this social obligation, the NSS Dept. of the college, comprising of 3 Program Officers and an energetic and enthusiastic group of students as volunteers, has been deployed to instigate various health awareness programs among the poor peasantry class of people residing at nearby villages.

#### **★** THE PRACTICE:

Under the guidance and presence of the program officers of NSS Dept, volunteers comprising of an energetic and enthusiastic group of students organized special camps in the nearby villages. The NSS team stay with the village people, perform different surveys on their health, hygiene and sanitation, organize Medical Camp with the help of local doctors, organize motivation camp for health consciousness.

The activities that have been manifested by the NSS Dept. for making the 'Healthy Youth for Healthy India' program success are summarized below:

- (a) Health Awareness and Motivation Camp;

- The sanctioned amount is debitable to the major head 1.B-(i)b and valid for payment during the current financial year only.

- 2. The amount of the grant shall be drawn by the Accounts Officer (Drawing and Disbursing Officer), University Grants Commission on the Grant-in-Aid bill and shall be disbursed to and credited to grantee as above through Demand Draft.
- 3. The grant is subject to the adjustment on the basis of Utilisation Certificate in the prescribed proforma submitted by the University/College/Institution.
- The University/College shall maintain proper accounts of the expenditure out of the grant which shall be utilised only on approved items of expenditure
- The Utilisation Certificate to the effect that the grant has been utilised for the purpose for which it has been sanctioned shall be furnished to the University Grants Commission as early as possible after the closing of the current financial year.
- The assets acquired wholly or substantially out of the University Grants Commission's grant shall not be disposed or encumbered or utilised for the purpose other than those for which the grant was given, without proper sanction of the University Grants Commission.
- A register of assets acquired, wholly or substantially out of the grant shall be maintained by the University/College in the prescribed form.
- 8 The grantee institution shall ensure the utilization of grant-in-aid for which it is being sanctioned/paid. In case of nonutilization/part utilization, the simple interest @10% per annum as amended from time to time on unutilized amount from the date of drawal to the date of refund as per provisions contained in General Financial Rules of Govt. of India will be charged.
- The University/College shall follow strictly all the instructions issued by the Government of India from time to time with regard to reservation of posts to Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes. 9.
- The University/College shall fully implement the Official Language Policy of the Union Govt. and comply with the Official Language Act, 1963 and Official Languages (used for official purposes of the Union) Rules, 1976 etc. 10.
